Round Table, Pete Goodman

Pete Goodman opened the floor for the Round Table Discussion. The Round Table discussion is for members seeking solutions to safety concerns and share experiences.

Topic:

- Drug/Alcohol testing has become a bigger expense because they are forcing alcohol testing every time someone is sent for a drug test.
- Competency templets are available -> KSA and AESC.
- Annual table top exercises USCG -> EPA may have additional requirements we have not heard of yet.
- Rick with Danos -> OOC (Offshore Operators Committee) is working on Best Practices for SEMS requirements.
- RP2D training now has API 7th addition.
- OPITO training is generally acceptable for GOM work.
- Employees may need more training for SWA; field personnel must have senior management empowerment; true SWA is not always stopping the entire job, sometimes it can only be applicable to stopping only one crew.

- We'll review history and current status, 1st round of SEMS audits, what to expect in 2nd round.
- API RP75 1st addition was published in 1991.
- SEMS I was published 10/2010
- SEMS II was published 4/2013 which included the SWA, Ultimate Work Authority, JSA updates and Emergency Phone numbers (in June -> 3 year audits accredited provider).
- Cycle 1 audit findings -> Most were able to incorporate SEMS requirements in existing HSE Management Systems. If they had none, companies have now developed one.
- Things like emergency response, auditing, and training have typically always been done.
- Management of Change has not always been applied; pre-startup review observations were lacking; hazard analysis not always understood; some triggers missing & not defined well.
- Operators are responsible to ensure contractors are properly trained and responsible for contractor oversight.
- Contractors can also receive INCs.
- RP75 will be revised and a little more explicit

Q&A

- Will SEMS plan to have maritime requirements to come? Not at this time.
- JSA Management Review -> Regulation says JSA must be approved and signed by person in charge. Should the MS define PIC? There is some flexibility, but not necessarily allowed to be designated.
- There needs to be a process for accrediting auditors of the operators. There is no official ASP (Accredited Audit Process) required; you need auditors looking at the right things, they need to know what's going on and test if system is adequately managing hazards. Auditors need to be held accountable.
- More focus on performance indicators needed.
- Employee participation will be defined by all levels of culture.
- How many whistle blowers received and how many bogus found? By law, voluntary near miss is held confidential. Regulators to open a window of tracking and intelligence of where problems are.

2nd Guest Speakers – Jeff Jackson, Environmental Scientist Supervisor, Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality, Stone Water Rigs or Government Inspections Watershed Based Inspections.

Pete Goodman introduced the next guest speaker, Jeff Jackson, with DEQ, to present "DEQ Regulatory Updates."

- DEQ was sued and had to prove 25% improvement and be able to prove it.
- The government wanted the same water quality for Louisiana waters as northern state waters.
- Louisiana had to help the government understand

- that Louisiana is flat land with still water not running streams.
- Consideration of designated use of waters to meet standards for wildlife and recreation.
- Irrigations, agriculture and potable supply:
 - Phase I Concentration on facilities who did not have permits or treatment centers and were discharging into waters.
 - Phase II Permitted compliance audits.
- Municipal Storm System (MS4) is responsible for every bit of water that hits the ground; holding all counties and municipalities accountable.
- Storm Water Management Plan (SWMP) is needed.
- DEQ has to report to Federal government every 2 years.
- The Health Department now has requirements to pump out septic tanks every 5 years for individual homes.
- Target watersheds will change every year.

Q&A

- Has DEQ also taken fish samples to determine water quality?
 - Yes, but funds come through Federal monies except for fish samples (funded by the state), therefore no fish samples have been taken in 5 or 6 years.
- As water gets cleaner, fish get cleaner and safer to eat
- Methyl Mercury was found in fish, moss, leaves and low PH waters, believed to be caused from combustible commissions of gasoline and diesel engines not specific to oil & gas companies
- Corp of Engineers want to regulate concrete and all surfaces.
